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

Every parent has the spiritual authority to give a blessing to their children and the Church encourages us to do so! When my kids were little I did this once in a while, when they were afraid of the dark or on their first day of school. However, there was one occasion that helped me understand just how powerful a parental blessing could be. One of my children suffered with nervous habits that became overwhelming and upsetting both for the child and for those observing them. One day we had a discussion about it and my child told me that it was something they felt they were powerless to control. It was obvious that it was a source of sadness and helplessness. They asked me for a blessing, and so I found the holy oil that was kept from the first blessing of our home years before, and I anointed the head and hands of my child and prayed aloud that God would remove these difficulties and replace them with His grace and peace. My child went away satisfied and as the days passed, I noticed less of those habitual ticks. We repeated the blessing only once more at the request of my child when it became apparent that these habits were recurring, and soon we saw them disappear forever. I would be lying if I said I wasn't shocked at the effectiveness of this blessing, but I am so very grateful to God for allowing me to help my child overcome his difficulties in this way.

Don't be afraid to bless your children! It's powerful. Enjoy the issue!

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ISPY IN MY LITTLE ICON

It's time for another round of I Spy in my Little Icon... and this one includes a little "spy" work of our own!! This month's image is the icon of St. Peter raising Tabitha from the dead. St. Tabitha was a widow who was known for her sewing skills and devotion to the poor. She served God and His Church in practical and important ways, making shirts and clothes for those who were in need. We know that she was a widow and well loved in her community. She was a highly respected model of Christian almsgiving and service.

Acts 9: 36-41 tells us the story of her death and subsequent miraculous rising from the dead. St. Peter was traveling and preaching in the area of Lydda when he was approached by messengers begging for his help. They told him that Tabitha was very ill and in need of healing from him. Unfortunately, by the time St. Peter arrived, she had already died. St. Peter sent everyone out of the room and prayed to God. He then called out "Tabitha, get up!" and she arose, healed and alive again!

The icon depicts this miracle for us, teaching the same as the written lesson but in image form. Tabitha lies on her bed, looking up at St. Peter. He is holding her hand, calling her to rise! She, responding to him, sits uphealed, whole, and brought back to life. When we are healed, we are called to action. St Tabitha is ready to get back to her good works for God!


At the head of her bed stand her friends, who were also widows and had asked for St. Peter to come to her aid. The gospel says that they were showing St. Peter all the beautiful sewing that Tabitha had been doing. May we all have friends as loyal and dedicated as our beloved St. Tabitha. Her friends saw her work and devotion to God and would not rest until they had found help for her. Their faith in God and love for her led to the miracle of St. Tabitha coming back to life!

St. Peter stands at the center of the icon, accompanied by a young man... and here comes our mystery! When we researched this icon, we could not find a definitive answer for who he is! At first, we imagined that it could be St. John, St. Peter's traveling companion in the area. He does look young! Then, I thought perhaps it was St. Luke. He is the author of this gospel and worked with some of the apostles directly. It is possible that he witnessed this miracle or heard the account from St. Peter himself. Another possibility is that, like the widows, he is simply an unnamed relative of St. Tabitha. It would make sense that as a widow, other relatives would be looking out for her. Or even the local church representative coming to verify the miracle. His robes look more formal than we often see in icons. What do you think is the most likely answer? (We'd love to hear!)

Let me close with something we do know for sure... In the icon, we see St. Peter with his right hand elevated in blessing over Tabitha. The way he holds his hand is significant. His thumb and ring finger meet together in the middle of his hand, symbolizing the unity of Christ's humanity and Divinity. The three remaining fingers that point up symbolize the Trinity- Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. It is important to remember that anytime we hear of a miracle through a saint's prayers, it is the power of God working through that man or woman, not the man or woman themself, who heals the person. When St. Peter holds his hand up for the blessing in this icon, he is teaching us that the power to heal comes from God and not from man.

CONFESSION CRAFT

This pure white figure represents a brand new and spotless baby soul created by God. As you can see, it has no markings and begins life on earth totally fresh and clean. As the soul matures, it can become decorated by graces that it gains by attaining the mysteries of Initiation, performing good works, and learning to grow closer to God in prayer.

These graces are like brilliant colors that make the soul more beautiful! To symbolize these graces, take your crayons and begin to decorate the image of the soul. Use the blue color to represent the water of baptism. Then use a golden yellow to remind us of the holy chrism used to seal the senses at chrismation. Then use red for the precious Blood and Body of Jesus in the Eucharist. Green is for the Holy Spirit, who whispers to the soul in prayer. Purple can symbolize a royal priesthood to which we are all called, and orange is for the fire of love we carry within ourselves as true Christians. How beautiful is our soul when it is adorned with graces! Fill in every space and make the soul as colorful and beautiful as possible!

Now, we must talk about something sad. No matter how good we try to be, every person is prone to a condition known as sin. Sin is a conscious decision to separate ourselves from the will of God. Adam and Eve committed the first sin when they disobeyed God in the Garden of Eden. They listened to the serpent's lies and ate the fruit from the tree of Good and Evil after God specifically told

them not to do so. By making this decision, they separated themselves from the will of God, and this hid some of the brilliant colors, graces, from their souls.

To symbolize this, take your black crayon, your darkest one, and color over the colors on the image of the soul you see on this page.

The more a soul sins, the thicker the darkness becomes. Continue to thickly color over all of the colors on the image of the soul until all of the graces are obscured by the black crayon.

Was it painful and sad to do this? Sin is painful and sad and obscures the graces of souls, so they become less brilliant and less beautiful. What is a sinful soul to do? Once a person sins, they can't go back and undo it. So what can be done to restore their soul to a better state?

Christ has ordained a very special process for us, the Mystery of Confession, that helps restore some of the beauty we lost through sin. Here's how it works.

When a soul realizes they have sinned, they can go to the priest and ask forgiveness (using the formula outlined on the next page!), and Christ promises us that whatever the priest forgives, He will forgive!! There is a catch, though. First, we must be genuinely sorry for the stain we have allowed to obscure our pure and brilliantly decorated soul. To the best of our ability, we must vow not to let that sin further damage us in the future.



Finally, we must do penance; this is the important part. The priest will assign us a task to be completed in reparation for our sinful task. This could be a good deed, a prayer or set of prayers, or something else which will prove to God that we are seriously sorry and desire to regain our lost grace.

Now, when we look at the image of the soul we drew, we realize that we can't erase the black crayon marks. These are permanent. So how does repentance restore our soul to its former beauty? Sadly, it can't. What it CAN do is make something beautiful out of what we have done, no matter how dark those deeds may have been. understand this better, take a dull pencil, symbolizing our penance, and begin to draw some beautiful designs upon the blackened image of the soul. What do you see shining through? The brilliant colors of the graces are still there! The more penance one does, and the more artfully, skillfully, and lovingly this penance is performed, the more our former graces can begin to shine through the darkness! God can even take our sins and use them to make a deeper and richer pattern of beautiful colors upon our souls! Indeed, our soul can never be restored to its perfection, but it can become beautiful and colorful once again through the Mystery of Confession.

How to Go to Confession in the Eastern Church

+In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The priest first prays for the penitent: May our Lord and God, Jesus Christ, be in your heart and on your lips that you may confess all your sins worthily in the name + of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Penitent: I confess to Almighty God, One in the Holy Trinity, to the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of God, to all the Saints, and to you, Father, all my sins.

(The penitent mentions the time since their last confession and confesses their sins.)

After confessing, the penitent prays: For these and all my other sins which I remember or cannot call to mind I am very sorry. I have offended God and have angered Him against me. I am sincerely repentant and promise with the help of God to better my life. For this I humbly ask of you, Father, salutary penance and absolution.

(The priest offers spiritual advice at this time and gives them a penance.)

Then the priest prays: Lord, our God, since You are gracious, accept the confession of your servant N, and remit all (her) (his) sins committed deliberately or through human frailty, either by word, deed, or thought. You alone have the power to forgive sins; for You are the God of mercies and loving kindness, and we give glory to You, + Father, Son and Holy Spirit, now and ever, and forever, Amen.

The priest places the epitrachil [stole] on the penitent's head, lays on his hands, and says the prayer of absolution:

May our Lord and God, Jesus Christ, by the grace and mercies of His love for mankind, forgive you all your transgressions. And I, a priest, although unworthy, by His power given me, forgive and absolve you from all your sins, in the name + of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Priest: Go in peace and sin no more.

Penitent: Thank you, Father!

What does the chalice look like at your local parish? Is it gold or silver? Are there small icons or engraved images on it? If you haven't noticed, the next time you go up to receive Communion, take a look or ask your priest if you can see it after the service.

Two silver chalices now located in the San Marco Cathedral in Venice, Italy have been linked to the Byzantine Empire and the looting of Constantinople during the Crusades. The one pictured below has an inscription at the base requesting prayers for the Byzantine Emperor Romanos (either the I or II) of the 10th Century.


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Sea pearls line the top and bottom of the chalice along with small enamel icons of the Theotokos, Christ, and other saints. The bowl within the chalice is made of sardonyx stone and is dated 200 years earlier than the rest of the chalice. Art Historians believe it was repurposed into a liturgical item because of its rarity and swirled coloring, reminding one of the red wine contained within it.

Why would Emperor Romanos request such rare and valuable items to be used in making this chalice? It is because during Liturgy it holds the Body and Blood of Christ, giving spiritual medicine to each of us. Our best things and artistic skills should be given to God first, because don't they already belong to Him?



Some worshippers kiss the icons on the base when receiving communion. Ask your parish priest about this tradition at your church.

The Mystery of Holy Anointing



When God created Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden, He proclaimed them perfect. In their sinless state, they enjoyed perfect health of mind, body, and soul. They didn't have to worry about sin or sickness or even death! Wouldn't that be wonderful?

Then they made the choice to disobey, and sin entered the picture. That first sin caused a ripple effect that led to the evolution of everything bad that exists in the world and that includes illness. We understand from the story of the man who was born blind that it is not our own personal sin, nor that of our parents or ancestors, that directly causes us to become sick. Rather it is the existence of sin in general and our human tendency toward it that takes away the perfection of health that God had in mind for us all when He created the first human beings.

Everyone becomes ill now and then, and everyone sins. We can't help it. We can, however, recognize this and take precautions to keep ourselves bodily and spiritual healthy. We must remember that although God doesn't want us to be sick, but when we do fall ill, He provides a way for us to return to health and can turn even serious illness into an opportunity for our salvation and spiritual health.

1 John 1:9 If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness.

In the Holy Scriptures we see that Christ's earthly ministry included a lot of healing. If you look, you can find over 25 accounts of either bodily or spiritual healing (the forgiveness of sins) included in the New Testament to prove it. The Church understands this and has provided two very important Mysteries for us to help us when we become spiritually or physically ill. These are the Mysteries of Confession and Holy Anointing of the Sick.

James 5:14-16 Is anyone among you sick? Let him call for the elders of the church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer of faith will save the one who is sick, and the Lord will raise him up. And if he has committed sins, he will be forgiven. Therefore, confess your sins to one another and pray for one another, that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person has great power as it is working.

We can make use of the Mystery of Holy Anointing when we are in a situation that places us in danger of physical death such as going into battle or facing dangerous medical conditions. This is why people call for the priest when someone becomes seriously ill and is in danger of dying. Many times this anointing alleviates the danger and the person is physically healed. Sometimes the danger remains, but the soul is alleviated of their anxiety and if it is accompanied by confession, their sins are alleviated as well.

Mark 6:13 And they cast out many demons and anointed with oil many who were sick and healed them.

Did you know that this Mystery of Anointing isn't only for the sick and dying, but for every true believer? This makes sense because we all suffer from some kind of mental, physical, or spiritual difficulty at some point in our lives. The Mystery of Holy Anointing is offered to us on Holy Wednesday services each year to prepare us for Great Friday and in anticipation of the Resurrection.

Be sure to watch for this on Holy Wednesday, at the beginning of the Presanctified Liturgy, when the priest consecrates the oil, saying,

"O Lord, through your mercy and compassion, you heal the afflictions of our souls and bodies. You, O Master, sanctify this oil that it may be for those who are anointed with it **healing and release from every passion, from defilement of flesh and spirit, and from every evil.** That in this, may your most holy Name, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, be glorified, now and ever and forever. Amen."

Later on in the service he continues to pray,

"Holy Father, physician of souls and bodies, you sent your only-begotten Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, to heal every infirmity and to deliver us from death. By this anointing, heal your servants of the spiritual and bodily ills which afflict them and restore life to them by the grace of your Christ, through the prayers of our most holy Lady, the Theotokos and Ever-Virgin Mary and of all your saints. For you, our God, are the fountain of healing, and to you we give glory, with your onlybegotten Son and your consubstantial Spirit, now and ever and forever. Amen."

Before the Great entrance, those who are to be anointed may come forward, but if they are too ill or disabled the priest may choose to go to them. He anoints each person on the forehead, cheeks, and the palms of the hands saying,

"The servant of God (here you may tell him your name) is anointed for the healing of soul and body, for the forgiveness of sins, and for life everlasting. Amen."



This month, along with the Holy Mystery of Confession, we also remember the Holy Mystery of Anointing. In the biblical world oil was understood to assist in healing. For example, think of the story of the Good Samaritan and the use of wine and oil. Wine, as a fluid, was used to flush out a wound. Since it contains alcohol, it also sterilizes the wound in the process. Oil was then applied to protect the wound from the elements and future infection. For this reason, oil, seen as a protection and medicine, was applied to people with just about any kind of illness and was even used by the apostles when praying for the sick (Mark 6:13; James 5:14). The Greek name for this Holy Mystery is euchelaion, which

During her martyrdom, she lost every one of her teeth, causing her to become the patron of dentistry and a great intercessor for those suffering tooth ailments. Rather than deny Christ, she eventually leaped to a fiery death and entered eternal life.


Everyone knows that St. Apollonia is the real Tooth Fairy, which is why our family homeschool celebrates Dental Health week this week each year as we celebrate St. Apollonia. It's a great week to "brush" up on good dental hygiene and make something special to keep our teeth especially bright. She likes all the teeth she collects to be pretty and clean so, once a week, we can polish them up to perfect brilliance with our own natural tooth polish. It's very easy to make!

Ingredients

- O 1/2 cup baking soda
- O 1 tsp fine sea salt
- O 10-15 drops essential oil of your choice (peppermint, spearmint, orange, lemon)

Preparation

Mix all these ingredients together and spoon it into a clean pint-size jar with a tight-fitting lid. Keep it in your bathroom and use it about once a week to remove stains and polish teeth to their natural whitest. It is a bit more abrasive than your usual toothpaste, so be sure not to damage your enamel by using it every day! Just dip your wet toothbrush into the mixture and polish away! You can make a pretty label and tie a ribbon around your jar and give it to a neighbor as a gift to remember our friend, St. Apollonia.





St Blaise, Heiromartyr



My dearest children, a long time ago, when our Church was still young, a little boy was born in Armenia. Armenia borders now modern day Turkey. This little boy was called Vlas (Blaise in English), and he grew up devoted to the Lord, living as a humble and pious Christian. He prayed constantly, always aware of God's presence with him (you can pray like this yourself: "Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner"). As he got older, other Christians began to notice Blaise's great holiness. So when it came time to choose a new bishop, the people knew who they wanted! They wanted a man

who was close to God in prayer and in his quick response to serve others. Blaise was chosen by everyone and consecrated bishop of Sebaste. In those days it wasn't uncommon for the people to choose a new priest or bishop from among themselves. Even today some of our eastern Churches, such as the Coptic Church, carry on the tradition of choosing their own priests.

At the time, the Christian Church was heavily persecuted. Some of Bishop Blaise's many tasks were to cheer up his flock, visit those in prison, and encourage those who were about to die for the True Faith. Bishop Blaise lived

in a cave on Mount Argeos, a little way outside of the city, where he could live and pray in relative peace. However, he wasn't left alone at all! All the wild animals recognized that this was a man of God. The animals would listen to his prayer and wait for him to finish praying so that they could receive a blessing. Many animals would come to him for healing. And not just the animals. People also came to visit this holy bishop and ask him for healing, consolation and prayer. Blaise lived a very active life in his quiet Poustinia ("desert" or hermitage), working many miracles, healing everyone who came to him, both man and beast. More importantly, he healed the souls of the people that came to him to confess their sins and ask for God's forgiveness.

Eventually the governor of the nearby city could not help but take notice. He sent an envoy to capture the bishop. Bishop Blaise cheerfully met the soldiers outside his cave, already dressed for the journey to the city. He informed the soldiers that he had had a vision of their coming and indeed, he was all ready to go and die for Christ.

As the soldiers escorted Bishop Blaise, the holy man continued to bless his people and the animals as he always did. When they passed by a widow weeping because a wolf had eaten her pig, the bishop told her: "Do not cry, the wolf will give you back your pig." Whereupon, to the astonishment of everyone present, the wolf came running back and vomited the pig whole and safe at her feet.


A little later, a woman was crying because her son was choking on a fish bone. A blessing from Bishop Blaise, and the fish bone flew out of the boy's mouth.

Eventually, the soldiers brought Bishop Blaise to the governor. They tortured him with rods, taunting him to profane the name of the Lord and worship idols. He remained strong, and when he was brought back to the prison after being beaten, seven devout women followed behind and wiped up his drops of blood on the ground as a precious relic. When the women were arrested, they were told to worship idols. The women said that they needed to bring the idols to the lake for proper cleansing ceremonies. When they were brought to the lake, the women threw the idols as far into the lake as they possibly could. They were tortured with wool combs, and when they began to glow with divine light, the emperor grew frightened and had them beheaded.

When the Holy Bishop was brought before the governor, he eagerly confessed his love for the true God. Because the holy women had just thrown the idols into the lake, the governor decided that would be how the holy man was going to die, too. Blaise made the sign of the cross over the lake, and when he was thrown in, he began walking on the water as though it was dry land. This showed that God's power through Blaise was stronger

than the idols, and the Governor didn't like this one bit. He roared angrily at Blaise. In response, Bishop Blaise challenged the governors' servants to call on their own gods and join him. The 68 men who attempted the feat immediately drowned. Bishop Blaise then saw an angel who asked him:

"Well, Blaise, are you ready to receive the crown of martyrdom?"



Blaise responded: "Yes! I am!"

"Then go to shore! The governor will kill you, and then you will dwell in Heaven with God forever!"

Blaise returned to shore, shining with God's Glory, and the livid governor beheaded him. Bishop Blaise went straight to Heaven where he was greeted by Jesus and his holy family who had died before him, eagerly waiting for his arrival.

We celebrate the feast of Saint Blaise on February 3rd or 11th, depending on which Christian tradition you follow. Did you know the name "Blaise" means "to stutter" or "to stammer"? I don't know if Blaise himself had a stutter, but if he did, he was not the first (or last!) holy man to have one. God worked through him and can work through any of us, too. He loves us in our weakness and loves when we give Him our troubles to transform into His glory. We pray to Saint Blaise for the health of domestic animals, for protection from wild beasts, for ailments of the throat, and for the suffering that comes with stuttering and having trouble saying the right things! Many people pray to St. Blaise when they are afraid or don't know how to say their sins in the Sacrament of Reconciliation, and he helps them courageously confess the sins that trouble them.

Troparion

You shared in the apostles' way of life and succeeded to their throne, divinely inspired bishop. You found access to contemplation in the active life. Therefore, you rightly taught the word of truth and struggled for the faith to the shedding of your blood. O Priest Martyr Blaise, pray to Christ our God to save our souls.

Kontakion

O God-bearing Blaise, you were a holy plant, an unfading flower, and a fertile vine in the vineyard of Christ. Fill with joy the hearts of those who celebrate your memory with fervor and never cease to intercede for all of us.

(make the sign of the cross with your thumb in the air, saying "pshht" for each stroke of the cross)





YOU WILL NEED


- I was **HUNGRY** and you gave me to eat;
