During the 19th Century (that's the 1800s), it was popular entertainment to act out a scene from a famous story. Participants would dress in costumes, design sets and scenery, and even play music to accompany the scene.

The audience would already be familiar with the story, and would enjoy the new and creative ways their friends and family presented the scene. For instance, a tableau might show the moment when Moses parts the water of the Red Sea with his staff, or maybe Joshua as the wall came down at Jericho.

This month, we celebrate the Dormition of the Theotokos. We know the story of how she fell asleep in the Lord and was taken up into heaven, where she lives today with her son, Jesus, and all the Saints. Your job is to take a few (or all) the lines from this Akathist and act them out, taking care to create a beautiful background for these descriptions of the Theotokos.

Here, an Akathist is a praise poem, with lines that are often an acrostic in alphabetical order, describing the virtues a person possesses. You'll see that these lines describe the character traits of Jesus' mother, the Theotokos, the God-bearer. Each line starts with a letter of the alphabet, in order.

Based on the English Alphabet, this alliterative

poem in praise of the Theotokos can be acted out in a series of tableaus – *motionless scenes*.
