## i SPY in MY LITTLE ICON

The icon of the Transfiguration teaches us about the story of Christ showing the disciples some of His glory on Mount Tabor. They were so shocked that they literally fell down and covered their faces! You can read this story in your Bible at the beginning of chapter seventeen in the Gospel of Matthew. As you read, look for the events of the story in the icon.

Here in the icon, Christ is surrounded by a large blue mandorla which signifies His glory. Do you notice the three letters inside the halo of Christ? When Moses asked God what he should call Him, God answered "I am he who is" (Exodus 3:14). Those three letters in the halo represent the Greek words for God's name, "He who is."

On either side of Christ, you see that Moses and Elijah have appeared with Christ. Moses and Elijah represent the law and the prophets of the Old Testament. By standing with Christ, Jesus reaffirms his statement that He has come not to "abolish the law or the prophets ...but to fulfill." (Matthew 5:17) Christ's life in the New Testament is not a separate revelation of God, but the fulfillment of His promise to rescue us from sin and death, promised and foreshadowed in the Old Testament.

At the bottom of the mountain, we see Peter, James and John laying on the groundshocked and covering their faces. particular apostles were chosen by Jesus to see special glimpses of His divinity in three instances shared in the Bible. The first was the raising of Jairus's daughter. The second was the Transfiguration, shared here; And the third was in the Garden of Gethsemane. We might wonder whu Jesus chose these three apostles. There are several possible reasons, but generally, it is stated that Peter was the first Patriarch, James was the first martyr of the apostles, and John was present at the crucifixion. In these unique positions, these apostles were close to Christ in His suffering and also close to Him in His exaltation.

Mount Tabor has been revered as a holy site throughout history. In 1924 the Church of the Transfiguration was built there over the ruins of a much older, 5th century chapel. Many people continue to make pilgrimages to the mountain to retrace the steps of the apostles following Christ so long ago. May we all seek to follow Christ and allow Him to reveal Himself to us, in as much of His glory as we can behold!



## Transfiguration Fun Facts

Did You Know?...



The feast of the Transfiguration occurs exactly 40 days before the Feast of the Exaltation of the Mount Tabor is a type of geological formation known as a monadnock. A monadnock is a hill that rises by itself from a level plane, rather than as part of a mountain range.

Although the feast of the Transfiguration occurs during the Dormition Fast, the fast is relaxed so that wine and fish are allowed.

It is customary to fast from eating grapes from the beginning of the Dormition Fast on August 1, until the feast of the Transfiguration.

We bless grapes on this feast because it occurs during harvest time, but more importantly because grapes undergo a transfiguration as well! They go from seed, to fruit, to wine. Then from wine, they are transformed during the Divine Liturgy into the Most Precious Blood of Christ in the Eucharist!

You were transfigured on the mountain, O Christ our God, revealing as much of your glory to Your disciples as they could behold.

Through the prayers of the Theotokos, let your everlasting light also shine on us sinners.

O Giver of Light, glory to you.



## The Transfiguration of Jesus



This month we celebrate the Transfiguration of Jesus on Mount Tabor. The English word "transfiguration" is from a Latin translation of the Greek word metamorphosis. This word is a combination of two Greek words, meta and morphos. The first word, meta, refers, in this case, to a "change." The second word, morphos, means shape. The -sis ending indicates "process of." Thus, "metamorphosis" means the process of changing shape. This word appears in the

science realm often. Just think of the change of a little egg to a

caterpillar to a beautiful butterfly!

## KNOW YOUR FALTH

Luke 9:28-36 But I tell you truly, there are some standing here who will not taste death until they see the kingdom of God." Now about eight days after these sayings he took with him Peter and John and James and went up on the mountain to pray. And as he was praying, the appearance of his face was altered, and his clothing became dazzling white. And behold, two men were talking with him, Moses and Elijah, who appeared in glory and spoke of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and those who were with him were heavy with sleep, but when they became fully awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. And as the men were parting from him, Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is good that we are here. Let us make three tents, one for you and one for Moses and one for Elijah"—not knowing what he said. As he was saying these things, a cloud came and overshadowed them, and they were afraid as they entered the cloud. And a voice came out of the cloud, saying, "This is my Son, my Chosen One; listen to him!" And when the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and told no one in those days anything of what they had seen.

Peter, James, and John went on a hike to the top of Mount Tabor with Jesus one day. They knew that Jesus often went to the top of a mountain to pray, and so they expected that this was what they would be doing there. However, when Jesus began to pray on this day, something different happened.

Imagine what it would have been like if you were with them. Imagine you were among them when they suddenly saw Jesus illuminated with a brilliant light, so bright that they could not keep their eyes open to see Him, and they all put their faces to the ground! This light is no ordinary light but the glory of God, and this is why it is said that no one can look upon the face of God the Father and live.

**Exodus 33:17-20** So the LORD said to Moses, "I will also do this thing that you have spoken; for you have found grace in My sight, and I know you by name." And he said, "Please, show me Your glory." Then He said, "I will make all My goodness pass before you, and I will proclaim the name of the LORD before you. I will be gracious to whom I will be gracious, and I will have compassion on whom I will have compassion." But He said, "You cannot see My face; for no man shall see Me and live."

When the men were able to open their eyes a bit, they could see two men with Jesus who were not there before. They recognized them as Moses, to whom the ten commandments of the law were given, and Elijah, the great Old Testament prophet. The Jews had great reverence for the law and the prophets, and Jesus was letting them know that it was He who fulfilled them both. These two biblical figures were most certainly from the dead, yet Jesus was having a conversation with them, showing them that He had authority over death as well.

Emotion overcame him at this sight, and Peter suggested to Jesus that they should set up accommodations for their guests and remain there on the mountain together for a while, but he got it all backward! This glimpse into the heavenly realm isn't meant for living men to see. Rather than accommodating Moses and Elijah, Jesus had made a unique accommodation for Peter, James, and John to temporarily visit the heavenly realm! Christ loved these men so much that He had allowed them to briefly witness His heavenly glory, His true state as the Son of God so that when they would see the events that were about to unfold concerning His betrayal, trial, and horrible crucifixion, they would understand His tremendous power and realize that He set his power aside for our sake. Jesus wanted them to know this. He wanted them to know He loved us that much. He wanted them to believe in Him. This wonderful feeling of being in God's loving presence on Mount Tabor that day would remind them of who Jesus really was, even when it looked like His enemies defeated him, and all was lost.

God allows some people to feel that same loving glory of heaven when they are in

prayer. Have you ever felt it?

Hot tears ran down 11-year-old Kolbe's face as he sat curled up beside his mother. "I want to go home," he whispered. Kolbe and his family moved across the country a year earlier leaving behind a church family that was as close to heaven-on-earth as one could hope in this life.

Although his family moved to a lovely new home and settled into a new parish blessed with love, beauty and many children, it was not home to Kolbe. He missed the friends he'd known since birth, the familiar hymns and the long Sunday afternoons spent building stick forts in the woods behind the church as his parents laughed with their friends on the back patio after Divine Liturgy.

Kolbe's friend Lucy moved away at just about the same time, and also aches with homesickness. "I never realized just how deeply these children loved each other," Lucy's mother said. "While all the parents were having our own little party each week, the children were sharing life with each other and growing up together."

While homesickness causes deep aching and sorrow, it is a common experience for all Christians who long for their ultimate home - Paradise.

We are told that after the Fall Adam sat outside the gates of Paradise weeping for his home for the rest of his life. Abraham journeyed his whole life seeking a home promised by God. And Moses wandered in the wilderness for 40 years along with the children of Israel leaving Egypt seeking a home promised by God.

In the Epistle to the Hebrews, there is a beautiful passage often nicknamed "The Hall of Faith" because it contains a list of patriarchs who wandered this life like pilgrims "looking for the city which has foundations, whose architect and builder is God" (Heb. 11:10).

If you take the time to read about these great patriarchs, you will see how often the Lord gives them a little glimpse of that Kingdom they are seeking and that little glimpse is enough to set a fire in their hearts so that they never turn back from seeking it. Abraham "rejoiced to see my day, and he saw it," Jesus told the Pharisees. The Patriarch Joseph received dreams that kept his faith alive. To Moses, God showed him the promised land from a mountain top. And Apostles Peter, James, and John, witnessed the Transfiguration.

As Jesus stood on Mount Tabor with Moses and Elijah shining in their glorified state, the apostles were amazed and didn't know what to say or do. All they knew was they wanted to stay there forever: "Lord, it is good that we are here," Peter blurted out. "If You want, I will make three tabernacles here: one for You, one for Moses, and one for Elijah," (Matthew 17:4).

But Jesus did not show the Apostles His glory and a glimpse of the promise so they could stay there or have the fulfillment immediately. He showed it to them so they would have strength through difficult and confusing trials. You see, just after the Holy Transfiguration, the religious leaders in Israel would begin seeking to kill Jesus and soon they would. The Lord knew that after his ascension, the apostles would be hunted for the rest of their lives and would have to give their lives for the testimony of Christ.

That glimpse of eternal glory on Mt. Tabor must have reassured the apostles often that the sufferings of this present age are not worthy to be compared with the glory of the eternal home they were seeking.

Sometimes, like little Kolbe, Lucy and their families, we have seasons in life where we get to bask in the glory of friendships and beauty, but then the Lord calls us away to a more difficult season. We can let those glimpses of glory keep us homesick for heaven, to remind us that we are seeking a kingdom beyond this world where we will love one another with perfect love, glowing in theosis for all eternity in our divine kingdom.

## Mount Tabor Cupcakes



When Peter, James, and John found themselves immersed in the presence of God, they could want nothing more. They were in the cloud of His presence. After having experienced that, they would never be the same. They would do things that would confound their friends and, quite frankly, terrify their enemies. Their devotion to Him would defy all logical reason, yet they would persevere. All they would ever want would be to convey that same love to others, let them feel what they felt, and know what they know, and they would begin to long for the day in which they could encounter Him like that again. At the feast of the Transfiguration, we gather fruit, historically the first fruits of the season (usually grapes), to take as an offering to the church to be blessed and distributed to the congregation. This recipe will help you remember Peter,

James, and John who witnessed the white sparkly light that surrounded Jesus on Mount Tabor that day!

Because this feast occurs during the Dormition Fast, the recipe is fast-friendly!

## Ingredients

- One box of chocolate cake mix
- One can of soda, any flavor
- One can of non-dairy whipped topping
- Both green and red grapes
- A few sprigs of fresh mint
- 1 small jar of grape jam
- 2 Tbsp sparkly castor sugar

## Preparation

Preheat your oven to 350 degrees. Empty the contents of the cake mix into a large mixing bowl and slowly whisk in the can of soda. Line a muffin tin with paper cupcake liners and fill each % full with batter. Bake for 20 minutes at 350 degrees and allow to cool completely while you have dinner.

Immediately after dinner, when your cakes have cooled, remove the paper liners from each cake and turn each one upside down on a serving platter. These are little Mount Tabors! Place a spoonful of grape jam on top of each cake, and sprinkle a few mint leaves on top of each of our mountains. Now place 2 Tbsp of jam into a separate bowl and add ¼ cup of hot water. Mix this to make a syrup. Place three red grapes and one green grape into the syrup and mix to coat. These are Peter, James, John, and the green one is Jesus! Now, transfigure Him by dipping the green grape into the sparkly castor sugar! Place a "cloud" of whipped almond cream onto the top of your Mount Tabor cake (over the jam) and place your three red grapes (Peter, James, and John) on top, and the sparkly green grape in the center of the three (this is Jesus!) Repeat this process for each of your cupcakes and enjoy immediately!







It seems right that a monastery on top of a hill standing like a beacon off the coast of Constantinople should be named Holy Transfiguration Monastery. As Mt. Tabor served for the Transfiguration of Christ, the hill atop the island of Proti (now Kinaliada) in the Sea of Marmara was home to the Holy Transfiguration Monastery during Byzantine times and also served as a place of exile for Byzantine Emperors who were forced from their thrones.

One such exiled ruler, Emperor Leo V the Armenian's (r. 813-820 AD) burial site is linked to the founding of the Holv Transfiguration Monastery. Other records show that the monastery was completed between 1070-1080 AD and is also connected with the exiled Emperor Romanos IV Diogenes (11th Century). After the fall of Constantinople by the hands of the Empire, Ottoman in 1453. monastery fell into disrepair. After years of neglect, in 1722, a group of devout Greek Orthodox Christians, from the island of Chios, rebuilt parts of the monastery structure and added a chapel devoted to St Paraskevi. The next year, 1723, Tsar Peter the Great of Russia sent the icons that are currently on the iconostasis in the new chapel located next door to the Byzantine monastery ruins.

The original icons recovered from the monastery were transferred to the Orthodox Church of Istanbul for preservation.

I imagine that when the Holy Transfiguration Monastery was lived in those in Constantinople, perhaps even leaders in turmoil, saw the lights of the monastery on the hill across the water and felt hope that even if abandoned by their political power and supporters, Christ would provide a place for them.
